Sunday 22 December 2024 – Fourth Sunday of Advent Readings: Year C

Dear Parishioners

Have you watched the latest Hilary Mantel televised novel "The mirror and the light", the third novel in the grand saga of Henry VIII and his entourage? The first two novels ("Wolf Hall" and "Bring up the bodies") both won the Booker Prize, the first time a British and a female author had done so twice and this third novel was short-listed. They are absorbing, entertaining...and in the words of David Starkey the Tudor historian "total fiction"! Mantel presents Cromwell as a noble liberal when in reality he was, in the words of Professor Simon Schama, "a monster".

Hilary Mantel was a cradle Catholic but had developed an almost obsessive and unbalanced hatred of the Church, and the novels, excellent as they are, demonstrate how it is possible to distort facts and convince people who do not know the reality of the situation. Mantel had a particular dislike for St Thomas More and he appears as an almost satanic, cold persecutor, contrasted to the soft light in which Cromwell is bathed.

How can we know the facts of a time when we were not present? That is a question asked about the Gospels. Are the accounts of Jesus life true or embellished? Commentators have formed the opinion that St Luke, this year's Gospel, is an accurate recording of events, and that the author can be "widely regarded as an historian among the ranks of Josephus, Herodotus and others." What is the Evangelist telling us? That the prophecies of the Old Testament are now coming to fruition, not in words but through the flesh and blood of a young girl called Mary. This is why Mary is so central and fundamental to orthodox Catholic Faith. Without her, there would be no birth, no Saviour, no eternal life. The Mass, Mary, the Cross: the three staples of our Faith. To downplay Mary's role is to dilute and distort the Incarnation, and traditions that have done so disappear into the rear-view mirror of ecclesiastical history.

Very soon we will be celebrating the great Feast of the Incarnation. We will adore with the shepherds, we will worship with the wise men, we will sing with the angels: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men." Let us join with Mary, Mother of God, as we welcome the Christ-child, Prince of Peace, into a world that needs Him so much.

It has been a very full year and I am looking forward greatly to celebrating this happy Feast with both parishes. Thank you again to everyone for such great support. God bless Fr Clive
